



Analysis of Student Feedback (2013-14)

Based on prescribed NAAC format a questionnaire was structured that helped us seek the views and opinions of the students. Random feedback was taken from about 300 students, a significant fraction of them belonging to 3rd year Honours students. Analysis can be categorised into the following heads.

1. Curricular Aspects:

The affiliating university viz. the University of Kalyani decides and implements the curricula that the college has to follow.

As evident from the feedback there is divergence in the opinion regarding the content or matter of the curricula. While many are satisfied with the existing course structure some feel that greater emphasis should have been given on the application side.

However there is overwhelming unanimity regarding the medium of instruction. Most of the students, particularly in science stream, feel the absence of quality text books in their mother tongue viz. Bengali language is arresting their comprehension of topics covered in the syllabus. However this difficulty is an initial one and fades with time.

2. Teaching , Learning and Evaluation:

Analysis of student feedback highlights the overall satisfaction prevalent amongst the student community. Students are satisfied with the time given to them for individual outside-class interaction from which a more inquisitive student is specially benefitted.

Some are perturbed at the delay in publication of results of final examination - an area which the college has nothing to do because they are conducted entirely by the university.

The feedback highlights student's eagerness to participate in seminars arranged by themselves where they wished the audience to be simply their classmates and the respective departmental teachers. The departments always encouraged such thinking and tried to act accordingly by complying with such feedback.

3. Infrastructural facilities:

It was evident from analysis of student feedback that library facilities should be made better – and the grievance could have been properly addressed by a full time librarian which presently the college does not have.

Students are quite satisfied with laboratory facilities offered by the science departments.

Few students wished to get a good facility of canteens.

4. Student support and recreational facilities:

The college boasts of multiple playgrounds and as evident from a feedback analysis this is a strong point of this college. Students enjoy playing kabaddi, football, volleyball and other games in the playground, as well as spend leisure time in the college gardens.

Students wished that the college maintain its campus clean and tidy and keep the gardens decked with plants and flowers so that the campus looks attractive and vibrant.

Feedback from Parents 2013-2014

Departments arrange parent-teacher meetings from time to time. A good fraction of the students live in adjoining villages and a significant percentage of their parents are weavers. Parents are always concerned about the future prospects of their wards. Parents are also concerned about the smooth running of the college and emphasizes that an academic atmosphere be maintained at all costs. Parents of first generation learners depend on the college faculty solely for shouldering the responsibility of making their wards stand in good stead in future.

Feedback from Employers 2013-2014

The Governing Body is the employing authority of the college, consisting of twelve members, four of which are teacher representatives, two non-teaching representatives, one student representative and the college Principal acts as Secretary of the Governing Body. Also there is one representative of the Government and two representatives of the affiliating university. These members uphold the points of view and feedback of the Government as well as the university in the Governing body meeting. Also the internal members give feedback of the college staff and students in the meeting. The President, who is an eminent and knowledgeable person, presides over the meeting. After discussion resolutions are taken, recorded and implemented by the Principal of the college.

Best Practices

• Introduction of on line admission

Online admission ensures transparency and with its introduction admission in the college has become fair and beyond reproach as it can be checked by anyone within or outside the college. Also the staff and teachers are always helpful to students who might feel a bit puzzled initially. The on-line payment facility has made the admission a best practice that the college is determined to follow in the years to come.

• Research work and academic activity

A significant section of teachers are involved in active research in their topic of interest and hope to be awarded doctoral degree in the near future.

Some of the teachers of the faculty who already hold doctoral degree from earlier research in universities have engaged themselves in furthering their research career.

Many teachers take classes in nearby universities and keep themselves abreast of latest developments and recent trends.

Some of the faculty are engaged in preparing manuscripts with the lofty intention to write books for the student community in different fields.

• Maintaining the college Garden

Our college has plenty of space and there are persons in the college who love to sweat under the sun planting, watering and weeding the college gardens. The flowers in the gardens provide the college campus with more than just nourishment.

Teachers and students take active interest in the gardens, located at multiple places and the multitude of multi-coloured brilliant flowers that dazzles in the garden brings positive changes in the student- attitudes as it has a scintillating effect on the surrounding atmosphere that at once gets warm and lively.

The flowers along with the natural bugs and birds contribute to the local ecosystem. The students recognize the importance of maintaining plant health and are automatically reminded of fostering good health habits. They also imbibe the culture of keeping environment clean, beautiful and pollution free.

- ✓ The college has a vast playground and the college can do much better in sports and games , in particular in team games like football, volleyball, kabadi, kho kho etc.
